PAID RESEARCH STUDY FOR TEEN VOLUNTEERS

The Understanding Emotions Study* is recruiting teen volunteers (ages 13-18) for a research study about emotions. (Some teens may be asked to participate in a short follow-up study, for which they would be compensated \$10). 

Talawanda Destination Imagination Program

Destination Imagination is an innovative creative problem-solving STEAM program for participants from kindergarten through high school. Teams of 5 to 7 students are challenged to solve one of six unique Team Challenges and an Instant Challenge with no adult assistance. Teams pick one of six challenges providing an opportunity to explore science, technology, engineering, fine arts, improv, and service. The season culminates with each team presenting at a tournament in the spring. Grades 3-12 compete against other area teams to qualify for competition at the Ohio state tournament.

Our regional tournament will be held on Saturday, March 16th, at Springboro schools. Teams forming will require a parent or other adult that is willing to volunteer their time to be a team manager. Free Manager/Coach training sessions are available in the fall.

It is time to begin forming and registering teams for this year. Please contact me in the near future if you are interested in helping to manage a Destination Imagination team this year. Without managers, we cannot have teams. We will be hosting an informational meeting about Destination Imagination on Wednesday, September 19th, from 6:30-7:30pm in the upstairs meeting room at the Oxford Lane Public Library located at 441 S. Locust Street. All are welcome to attend. Information will explain the program, how teams are formed, and how to become a team manager. Sign ups will also be available for children interested in participating.

Gifted Testing Request Information

General Test Information: Every student has the opportunity to be assessed for gifted identification twice during the school year. We are now taking referrals for fall testing, grades 3-8 through September 30, 2018. The tests determine gifted identification in accordance with state law & district policy. Results from the tests determine possible gifted service for this school year. Please review the information below for test dates and how to register.

Names and Type of Tests: The CogAT is a cognitive test. This tests produces a school ability score, which is similar to, but not the same as, an IQ test. In essence, they measure a child's reasoning ability and are predictors of a child's ability to perform in an academic setting. The Cognitive Abilities Test (CogAT) Form 7 has 3 batteries of tests: Verbal, Quantitative, and Nonverbal.

The IOWA is an achievement test. These tests produce a percentile rank, a **95%ile** or higher is needed to be identified as gifted. A National Percentile Rank (NPR) indicates your student's rank with other students in the nation. Percentile ranks range from 1 to 99. We offer testing in the areas of mathematics, reading, science and social studies.

Students with Previous Gifted Identifications: If your student has already been identified as gifted in any area, he/she remains identified as gifted in that area K-12 and does NOT need to test again.

Students may be identified as gifted in one or more of the following areas: Superior Cognitive Ability, specific academic achievement (mathematics, reading, science, social studies), Creative Thinking Ability, and Visual & Performing Arts.

- Please note Formal gifted services do not begin until 3rd grade
- All 2nd and 5th graders will be screened in the areas of superior cognitive ability, mathematics, reading and creative thinking. 2nd grade will be screened in the spring and 5th graders were screened this fall.
- Visual & Performing Arts courses are only offered at the high school and screening for these
 courses takes place at the high school level.
- There are currently no gifted services for Creative Thinking
- All testing that is done in the spring 2019 is for service in the 2019-2020 school year.

The Talawanda School District assessment schedule is beginning its 1st round of testing. All referrals for the fall testing round are <u>due no later than September 3oth</u>, by completing the online form <u>Request for Gifted Testing</u>.

We ask that parents understand that we schedule rooms, proctors, materials, etc. and that the earlier a parent/guardian registers the better it is for everyone. Referrals after September 30th are placed on a list for the next testing round in the spring. Testing will be completed in October and score reports will be mailed home within 30 days after testing.

Dear Parents.

This letter is to inform you that there are several students within the building that have severe peanut/tree nut allergies. Strict avoidance of peanut/tree nut products is the only way to prevent a life threatening allergic reaction. We are asking your assistance in providing the students with a safe learning environment.

If exposed to peanuts/tree nuts the student may develop a life-threatening allergic reaction that requires emergency medical treatment. The greatest potential for exposure at school is to peanut products and tree nut products. To reduce the risk of exposure, the following classrooms will be peanut free and tree nut free: Jewett (102), Waite (104), Evans (106), Huelsman (107), Todd (110), and Gonzales (501). Please, do not send any peanut or tree nut containing products for your child. Any exposure to peanuts or nuts through contact or ingestion can cause a severe reaction. If your child has eaten peanuts, peanut butter, or nuts prior to coming to school, please be sure your child's hands have been thoroughly washed prior to entering the school.

If your child does bring food to the classrooms listed above, it must be pre-packaged with an ingredient list so it can be checked for safety. Nothing with any nut, peanut, or tree nut will be allowed in the classroom. Please be aware that anything that "may contain" or was "processed in a facility that also processes nut products" will not be allowed as well.

Your child may still bring nut products for lunch to be consumed in the cafeteria. Additionally, we encourage all students to wash their hands thoroughly before and after handling food.

We appreciate your support of these procedures. If you have any questions, please do not hesitate to contact me.

An emergency is any unexpected incident that could affect the health or safety

> such as a disruption in utilities or a national emergency. Emergencies can affect one child, one ol, or the entire school district.

When an emergency occurs, school officials evaluate the seriousness of the situation and determine the best plan of action to respond quickly, safely, and appropriately. Emergency responders such as police, fire, and medical teams are notified and assist as needed.

EMERGENCY RESPONSE

Each Ohio school district has an emergency preparedness plan outlining possible scenarios and responses that vary based on

training, determines the best crisi response. In the event that the response includes an emergency student dismissal, it is important for parents to understand that students will be dismissed to parents once danger has passed.

In any emergency situation it is critically important that school leaders and safety personnel rend quickly. According to law orcement and safety officials, it is important that parents wait for a call to pick up their children rather than rush to a site. Parents of students in the affected building will receive detailed information as

FOUR COMMON RESPONSE OPTIONS

LOCKDOWN

A lockdown may be used in response to an event inside or outside of a building. During a lockdown, students are restricted to their class-room and are not released from the classroom until lockdown procedures have concluded.

SHELTER-IN-PLACE

2 This protective action is enacted when an event takes place outside of the building and officials determine that the safest course of action is to keep students and staff inside the building until the external event is resolved. During shelter-in-place, there could be student movement within the building, but students will not be released from the building until the shelter-in-place procedures have concluded.

If it is unsafe for students and staff to remain inside the building, the building will be evacuated. Students and staff may remain on school grounds until the building is safe to re-enter or may be relocated to a safe location off of school property, depending on a variety of circumstances.

This procedure will take place if your school officials determine students are safer at home than at school or trying to get to school. This most often occurs due to loss of utilities or a weather emergency.

If your school or school district intends to send students home or evacuate from a risky location to safe location, specific information will be communicated to the parents of affected students through a phone call.

RESPONSE TO ACTIVE AGGRESSOR

trained three times each year in an emergency response process known as ALICE. Most often used in the event of an active aggressor, ALICE empowers students and teachers to ensure their

It is important to remember that ALICE is not a linear progression and response action, but is dependent on the individual situation. Decisions are made by teachers and students to ensure their personal safety.

ALERT: Alert students and staff of an active agressor.

LOCKDOWN: Barricade a locked door with large objects, such as desks, chairs, shelves, etc.

INFORM: Listen for communication, make informated decisions as to what action should be taken.

COUNTER: If confronted by an aggressor, attempt to distract or confuse in order to get away.

EVACUATE: Leave the area if it is unsafe based on all available information and observations

In the event of an emergency situation during which a parent child from school, or one that requires students to go will care for each student until a parent arrives or the student home using district school transportachild will be left alone.

Parents who elect to emove students during the time of an evacuation will need to report to a designated area with photo ID to sign out students. Emergency contacts designated for student release by parents may also remove specific students from school with a pho-to ID. - 2. Complete a reunification card:
- 3. Be escorted by a staff member to his/her child; and
- 4. Sign the reunification card to ensure all students are accounted for and safe.
