Research shows that students who have opportunities to identify and nurture their sparks are more successful academically, socially, emotionally and physically.


Teaching and Learning

Talawanda is happy to announce a new partnership with University of Cincinnati's Informational Technology (IT) Department. The goal of the partnership is to increase the number of high school students in the pipeline on the way to careers in IT. High paying jobs are not being filled in IT in the state of Ohio and this program allows students to begin taking courses, some online and some with our own instructor, that will lead to Associate's, Bachelor's or Master's degrees in IT. Some students may even leave Talawanda with their first year of UC's IT program completed. This year the groundwork is being laid, including a new introductory course being offered at TMS to develop interest. Beginning in 2018-19, the course pathway will be put into motion. 
School Climate

Talawanda School District strongly believes that building relationships is at the center of instruction, and those positive relationships are an essential component for students to achieve their full potential. The Talawanda School Climate Committee (and sub-committees) meets regularly to discuss current concerns and plan for students needs. Each school implements programming which includes anti-bullying strategies, programs that cultivate and support respect.

The district equity plan utilizes short-term and long-term strategies as a blueprint for shaping the future diversity actions as it focuses on the following five main steps: 1.) develop a diversity leadership team to administer and implement the plans and evaluations; 2.) recruit, hire, and maintain quality staff that represent the diverse needs of the student population; 3.) increase cultural proficiency of staff; 4.) increase outreach for the purpose of engaging community members; and 5.) increase student engagement.

This year the high school has launched "Project Civility". This program was introduced by Miami University Hamilton, and the focus is on recognizing random acts of kindness, and commemorating those moments with the exchange of a wooden token. The design for the token was made by a 2017 THS graduate, and was sponsored by a grant from the Talawanda-Miami Partnership. Legislative Update - HB 410 New legislation was introduced on October 10th called the "Deregulation Bill." This bill was created by Senator Huffman along with superintendents from across the state in an effort to address student needs around licensure. teacher evaluations, student testing, student attendance, and safety management. This bill is widely supported by educators across the state of Ohio due to the support it will provide to students and teachers in our public schools.
